Summary of Program Highlights

The Centre for Military and Strategic Studies (CMSS) Security and Defence Forum (SDF) Program at the University of Calgary (U of C) remains committed to promoting and developing excellence in military, security and defence studies, and elevating its profile as a leading Centre of Excellence in North America over the next five years.

Over the past two years, especially, CMSS has expanded significantly to the encouragement and promotion of advanced research, teaching and outreach. CMSS has received strong support from the University and the Calgary community. The University has a strong interest in military, security and defence studies, as evidence by the faculty, staff, students, and course offerings at the University, the institutionalization and integration of the research, teaching and public education activities within the University, and the degree to which the University provides salaries, benefits, space, administrative support, and library resources, in support of the CMSS.

The following highlights for the 2006-2007 program year deserve recognition.

Engagement of Faculty and Students in SDF Program Activities

The number of U of C students and faculty directly engaged in SDF activities continues to expand. Course offerings and enrollments at both the undergraduate and graduate levels remain high.

CMSS graduated 16 Master of Strategic Studies (MSS) students in 2006-07. Graduates have accepted positions relating to security and defence in government and industry. As of March 2007, CMSS has 24 MSS students and eight special case PhD students. Each of our students has a diverse background ranging from Political Science to History to Anthropology. Admission offers for September 2007 have been made to eight outstanding MSS applicants (from the University of Calgary, University of Victoria, Simon Fraser University, University of Alberta and Carleton University) and one PhD student applicant from the University of St. Andrews.

The Centre continued its support of graduate and undergraduate research assistants and its support of student activities. During the 2006-07 program year, 23 core faculty and 35 graduate students were engaged in SDF program activities. The Centre was pleased to continue its support of the Calgary Model United Nations Team (UCMUNT) and Society for Military and Strategic Studies (SMSS) and its 9th Annual Conference, *War and Security: The Costs of Conflict*.

Of particular note, CMSS has continued collaboration with Dr. Hrach Gregorian, President, Institute of World Affairs. Dr. Gregorian and Research Associate Lara Olson are co-organizing the workshop *"Coordinated Approaches to Security, Development and Peacemaking: Lessons Learned from Afghanistan and Liberia"* 30-31 March 2007.

CMSS continued to strengthen its relationship with the University of Calgary Library. John Wright joined the University in January 2007 as the Military and Strategic Studies Librarian/Archivist. John holds a Masters of Library and Information Science from the University of Western Ontario and a Masters in Soviet and East European Studies from Carleton University. Since 2000, John has worked as a research analyst at the Parliamentary Research Branch of the Library of Parliament and as a consultant, a policy analyst, and a policy advisor within the federal public service.

The Centre for Military and Strategic Studies welcomed Colonel (Ret'd) M.D. Capstick as an Associate effective January 2007. Mike Capstick is particularly interested in research that involves the "whole of government" approach to Canadian International Policy and its application in 21st Century conflict. His most recent experience is at the strategic level in Afghanistan and at the political-military interface, both on the ground in Afghanistan and at the inter-departmental level in Ottawa.

SDF Program Highlights, 2006 – 2007

The renewal of the five year SDF grant assisted the Centre significantly in building upon its strengths and existing expertise.

Funding

As indicated in last year's annual report, graduate student support for the MSS program and special case Ph.D. program was expanded as a result of external donations, along with new course offerings, including defence economics, military anthropology, unconventional warfare, and domestic and hemispheric security. The MSS Co-op proposal has been approved by the University and CMSS will be recruiting students for this program over the next year. A formal PhD program proposal has been submitted for approval and endorsement by the University.

Of particular note, the donations have supported CMSS graduate students through the creation of CDFAI/Child Memorial Doctoral and Masters Scholarships.

The Centre's revenue for 2006-07 totaled over \$1 million. Funding from SDF, the University of Calgary, donations, and conference support, allowed the Centre to focus on teaching, research, and outreach activities. Approximately ten percent of the Centre's overall budget will be carried forward in 2007-08. This, in part, resulted from the fact that post-doctoral Fellowship Top-up Awards were not made in 2006-07.

The Centre is pleased to announce the creation of the J.L. Granatstein post-doctoral Fellowship, which has been awarded to Dr. Patrick Lennox for 2007-08. This fellowship position consists of a \$38,000 stipend over a 12-month period. The position also includes a \$5,000 travel and research allowance. No teaching is required, and the Fellow will join the Centre's faculty in its ongoing research projects. There are only a small number of post-doctoral positions available to security and defence issues in Canada each year and CMSS prides itself on being able to provide such a position. In September 2007, Dr. Patrick Lennox will join CMSS in this position. Dr. Lennox received

his PhD in Political Science (2006) from the University of Toronto. He will be working on a research project entitled, *Cooperation and Contradiction: Canada-U.S. Security and Defence Relations in the Age of Terror*.

Funding priorities for 2007-08 include increased funding for graduate students, including research support and travel stipends.

Curriculum Development

Over the 2006-07 program year, CMSS held one block week course to enhance its course offerings. **Dr. Joel Sokolsky** from the Royal Military College of Canada taught *Contemporary United States Defence Policy*, in response to recommendations made in the Centre's unit review completed in 2005.

CMSS continues to collaborate with other departments to strengthen and broaden specialization options for graduate students. Future offerings may include:

STST 651.49 – A Project Management Approach to Resolving Political Disputes: Israeli/Palestinian Dispute. This course is to be offered in cooperation with the Israeli Studies Program and the Schulich School of Engineering, both at the University of Calgary.

Students

CMSS has been very successful this past year in graduating MSS students. Fifteen MSS students completed their program in the 2006-07 program year bringing the total number of MSS alumni to 29. All but one of the CMSS graduates is either employed in the defence and security field, conducting research or pursuing other postgraduate opportunities. Each alumnus keeps in touch with CMSS and we post their progress on the alumni section of the CMSS website.

Council for Canadian Security in the 21st Century

The Council for Canadian Security in the 21st Century (CCS21) was established in November 2001 to raise awareness of security and defence issues and to provide a meaningful forum for Canadians to debate openly defence policy and the future of the military. CCS21 currently has 1520 registered members, as well as 783 discussion board users. (www.ccs21.org)

Publications

The Centre's faculty, research associates and graduate students sustained a strong publication record for 2006-07, publishing in more than fifty academic and scholarly journals and academic and private presses.

The *Journal of Military and Strategic Studies* continued to receive increased attention; total hits to the JMSS Website doubled over the past year. JMSS aims to be a journal of record for debates on contemporary Canadian strategic policy.

To further its mission of public education, and shaping the debate on Canadian military and foreign policy, and strategic studies in general, CMSS is establishing a numbered series, "Calgary Papers in Military and Strategic Studies", under the direction of Dr. John Ferris, series editor. The series will augment and extend its present forms of electronic publication. These volumes will draw from the work of Fellows and students of CMSS. Several volumes are already in press.

Conferences and Events

The Centre sustained its organization and sponsorship with SDF support of over forty lectures and seminars. Centre associates participated in more than sixty relevant conferences, workshops, seminars, and political meetings.

CMSS provided funding in support of several conferences and workshops in 2006-07, including Continental Defence: Policies, Threats and Architecture, Transportation Security Conference (in cooperation with the Van Horne Institute), NATO Transformation: Revitalization for the Future Conference, SMSS War and Society Conference: The Costs of Conflict, and the Popularization of War Memory, in conjunction with the Faculty of Communication and Culture at the University of Calgary.

In September 2006 the Centre was pleased to participate in the third annual SDF Conference, held in Kingston, Ontario, and looks forward to future conferences hosted by other SDF Centres.

New Initiatives

Canadian Peacebuilding Coordinating Committee (CPCC) – In June 2005 CMSS became an organizational member of this Canadian NGO network devoted to policy dialogue between NGOs, research institutes, and government on how to address the causes and consequences of violent conflict. CMSS affiliates regularly participate in the annual Peacebuilding and Human Security Consultations in Ottawa, hosted by Foreign Affairs Canada, the Canadian Peacebuilding Coordinating Committee, the Canadian Consortium on Human Security, and the International Development Research Centre. A website on the mandates, multifaceted composition, structures, performance and challenges of current UN and other peace operations that Canada participates in has been created, contributing to public policy debates on international peace operations. CMSS research fellow, Lara Olson, is the CMSS contact for this network. (<http://www.peacebuild.ca/powg/POM/>)

NGOs, Aid and Conflict Program – This program, led by Research Fellow Lara Olson, focuses on the role that international humanitarian and development aid play in conflict zones and in transitions from war to peace, through research and engaging operational NGOs in ongoing dialogue about lessons from experience. Speakers, workshops and research projects are being proposed to expose students to the critical NGO component of peace operations and nation-building exercises currently undertaken to address today's civil wars and failed states.

Regimental Histories Digitization Project – External funding has been secured for a Regimental Histories Digitization Project, coordinated by Jan Roseneder, in partnership with the University of Calgary Library, the Military Museums of Alberta’s Library and Archives, the University of London (UK), and the War Office Library in Great Britain.

Collaboration

Closer collaboration resulted from the SDF conference in Calgary in November 2004 and subsequently in Quebec City, Quebec in Fall 2005 and Kingston, Ontario, in Fall 2006 among faculty, administrators, and students.

On the U of C campus, the Centre continues its close cooperation with the Faculty of Social Sciences, the Faculty of Graduate Studies, and the Departments of History, Political Science, Anthropology, Economics, the Israeli Studies Program, the Schulich School of Engineering, the Institute for United States Policy Research and the Haskayne School of Business. The Centre is exploring a number of collaborative prospects with the Faculty of Fine Arts and the Military Museums of Alberta.

Cooperative relationships with the Royal Military College of Canada, the Canadian Forces Leadership Institute, Canadian Forces College, DND Public Affairs, and the U.S. Consulate-General in Calgary continue to benefit both faculty and students.

This past fall, Dr. Anne Irwin and Dr. David Bercuson began serving on the Royal Military College of Canada’s Board of Directors. Closer collaboration between CMSS and RMC is being cultivated.

The Centre is grateful for the guidance and support of its Fellows and Board of Directors.

2007-2008 Priorities

In support of the University’s strategic priority to “enlarge high-quality graduate programs, especially research-oriented doctoral programs that support our strategic priorities,” graduate students remain a high priority for the Centre. Recruiting high quality students and establishing a competitive funding package is essential for elevating the Centre’s profile as a leading Centre of Excellence in North America over the next five years.

Closer collaboration with CMSS Fellows, cooperation with RMC and other DND organizations, continues to be a priority for CMSS.

CMSS will be hosting a conference entitled ***Forced to Change: Education and Reform in the Canadian Forces 10 Years After*** from 15-18 November 2007 at the Palliser Hotel in Calgary. This conference will examine the past ten years since the 1997 Young Report, a Report to the Prime Minister on the Leadership and Management

of the Canadian Forces. More information will be available on our website in the coming months.

We have been asked to comment on the impact on activities if SDF funding were unavailable. As stated last year the impact would be very detrimental to the scholarly environment for graduate students and researchers. SDF funding directly supports graduate students to present their research at scholarly conferences, and in 2005/06 CMSS decided to provide \$15,000 in scholarship funding to CMSS students through the SDF grant. SDF funds a portion of the administrative staff at the Centre and provides conference travel funds and thesis research awards to assist students in their academic careers.

Observations

The CMSS faculty, staff, research associates, and students wish to acknowledge the ongoing support of the Department of National Defence, and particularly thank members of the office of the Directorate of Public Policy for their assistance.

We extend special recognition and appreciation for the international conference travel fund initiated by SDF in 2003-04 and for the creation of the domestic conference fund established in 2006-07. The expansion of the Special Projects fund has greatly assisted CMSS in contributing to defence and security issues. We are appreciative of the efforts of SDF in preparing a regular newsletter and for bringing graduate students together for policy dialogues and SDF scholarship recognition.

We appreciate and recognize the work of the SDF Selection Committee members in reviewing and providing feedback on the annual reports. The research, teaching, outreach, and educational opportunities at SDF Centres across Canada contribute significantly to the debate on defence and security issues facing Canada. SDF funding and recognition of this work is paramount to the continuation of the program. The committee members may note that the number of events participated in by professors and students has decreased since last year. Since faculty members at the University of Calgary no longer have to complete annual reports for the University in January, gathering information for the SDF annual report has proven more difficult.

With closer relationships with the SDF program in Ottawa and other SDF Centres of Expertise, CMSS looks forward to being a leader in military, security and defence studies in the years ahead.

Introductory Section One – Mission Statement

What is the Centre's mission statement?

The Centre for Military and Strategic Studies (CMSS) is a research institute within the Faculty of Social Sciences at the University of Calgary (U of C) and has been identified as a Pillar of Prominence at the U of C. Its purpose is to promote and develop excellence in military, security and defence studies. The Centre seeks to advance this mandate by:

- coordinating research programs relevant to international and national policy makers relating to military, security and defence issues;
- fostering informed debate through the organization of conferences, workshops and seminars that bring together academics, students, experts, policy makers, and the general public;
- providing educational opportunities for students through the Master of Strategic Studies (MSS) program, special case Ph.D. program and MSS Co-op program;
- providing opportunities for graduate and undergraduate students to advance their careers through engagement in research in a challenging and productive environment;
- disseminating the results of faculty and student research through electronic publication, support for conference participation, and through its website;
- collaborating with colleagues and programs at the U of C, with Canadian institutes and centres, with institutions abroad, with departments in the Canadian government, and with regional and international organizations.

The Centre's major research foci are:

- Canadian military studies
- Civil-military relations
- Defence economics
- Unconventional warfare (includes terrorism and counter insurgency)
- Domestic/hemispheric security
- Ethics and morality in conflict
- Seapower/naval history
- Arctic security
- Strategic thought
- Israeli security studies
- United States policy and politics

The Director of the Centre is Dr. David Bercuson, FRSC, OC, who works closely with Dr. Rob Huebert, Associate Director, Dr. Holger Herwig, Canada Research Chair in Military and Strategic Studies, and Dr. Patrick H. Brennan, Graduate Program Coordinator.

The Centre is committed to its vision and program of activities, fostering closer working

relationships with other SDF Centres and working in partnership with the Canadian Defence & Foreign Affairs Institute (CDFAI) and the Arthur J.E. Child Foundation.

What is the relationship between the mission statement and the activities of the SDF Centre?

The Centre for Military and Strategic Studies has grown considerably under the Directorship of Dr. David J. Bercuson. The Centre seeks to advance the study and understanding of military, security and defence issues through the following activities:

- curriculum development and teaching in support of the Master of Strategic Studies (MSS) program, Master of Strategic Studies (MSS) Co-op program, and the special case Ph.D. program;
- support for research, across disciplines, relevant to military, security and defence studies;
- encouragement of informed scholarly and public debate on military, security and defence studies;
- organization of conferences, lectures and seminars;
- participation in academic and public meetings to promote high quality, policy-relevant research;
- dissemination of information and materials to the academic and attentive public communities in Canada and abroad regarding military, security and defence issues; and,
- cooperation and coordination with university, government, non-governmental, and private sector partners to broaden perspectives, share resources, and advance policy-relevant research and debate.

How do the activities undertaken in the current fiscal year match with those in the original five-year funding proposal?

The following activities were undertaken in the 2006-2007 program year:

- **Major Themes of Research and Program Activities**
 - Canadian military, security and defence issues – organization of, and participation in (on and off campus), numerous lectures, seminars, conferences; support for faculty and graduate student research on defence and security issues.
 - Organization of the following conferences: *Continental Defence: Policies, Threats and Architecture* (3-5 May 2006); *Transportation Security* (2-4 October 2006, co-sponsored with the Van Horne Institute, University of Calgary); *NATO Transformation* (2-4 November 2006, co-sponsored with NATO).
 - Organization of the conference: *The Popularization of War Memory* with Dr. Michael Keren of the Faculty of Communication and Culture. This conference was held during Veterans' Week on 6-7 November 2006. It explored the transition in war commemoration from traditional commemoration activities (i.e. parades, statues, memorials, etc.) to more popularized forms of commemoration intended to attract the general public who has largely lost interest in the history of war and is increasingly inundated by elements of popular culture. An

interdisciplinary and international group of scholars focused on the means of commemoration adjusting to these trends by turning war memory into items and lifestyle events intended for wide consumption, such as computer games, virtual museums, and battle site tourism. The purpose of the conference was to identify the nature of the contemporary transformation and to understand its meaning and effect on the collective memory of war and dissemination of the norms associated with war (bravery, comradeship, resilience, devotion to the task, etc.) in the public sphere of different nations and the world. The conference welcomed Dr. Jay Winter from Yale University as its keynote speaker.

- Organization of the workshop: *"Coordinated Approaches to Security, Development and Peacemaking: Lessons Learned from Afghanistan and Liberia."* (30-31 March 2007)

The workshop will focus on the experience of recent international interventions in Afghanistan and Liberia, as case studies. The two-day workshop brings together representatives of the main actors in such peace operations: experienced personnel from aid agencies, government policymakers, the military, NGOs, together with analysts of peacebuilding and peace operations and representatives from the case study countries.

- ***Engagement of students and support of student activities***

- Support for graduate students: SDF funding support for teaching assistantships, research assistantships, plus travel and related support for thesis research and conference participation;
- Support for undergraduate and graduate students through the Society for Military and Strategic Studies (SMSS):
 - SDF funding to support activities of students to attend conferences and assist with research travel costs;
 - SDF funding to support the SMSS 9th Annual Student Conference on *War and Security*.

- ***Enhanced cooperation with other Institutes, on and off campus***

- Canadian Defence & Foreign Affairs Institute (CDFAI) – co-sponsorship of the *Journal of Military and Strategic Studies*, the Ross Ellis Memorial Lecture in Military and Strategic Studies, scholarships for Masters and PhD students and the Canadian Military Journalism course;
- Centre for Information Security and Cryptography – co-sponsors of monthly lectures on defence and security;
- Department of National Defence, Royal Military College of Canada, Canadian Forces College and other SDF Centres and military organizations.

- ***CMSS Publication Series***

- To further its mission of public education and shaping the debate on Canadian military and foreign policy, and strategic studies in general, CMSS is establishing a numbered series, "Calgary Papers in Military and Strategic Studies", under the direction of Dr. John Ferris, series editor. The series will augment and extend, rather than replace or duplicate, its present forms of electronic publication. These volumes will draw from the work of Fellows and students of CMSS.

Several volumes are already in press.

- ***Peace Operations Monitor (POM)***

Peace Operations Monitor is a web-based resource providing up-to-date factual information on complex peace operations. It provides an independent source of information about the mandates, multifaceted composition, structures, performance, and challenges of military and civilian aspects of UN and other peace operations. It draws on publicly available data from UN, NATO, national government, media, academic, and NGO sources regarding military deployments and humanitarian, development and peacebuilding activities to reveal a more comprehensive picture of selected international peace operations.

What activities are planned for next year? How do they match the original five-year funding proposal?

For the 2007-08 program year, the following activities are planned:

- ***Major Themes of Research and Program Activities***

- *Journal of Military and Strategic Studies (JMSS)*

- The aim of JMSS is to be a journal of record for debates on contemporary Canadian strategic policy, to publish internationally on a regular basis, to include graduate students, non-academic commentators, academic contributors, and serving and retired military officers;
- Support for research assistants;
- Collaboration with Editorial Board;
- Support for the "Calgary Papers in Military and Strategic Studies".

- Annual Ross Ellis Memorial Lecture Series in Military and Strategic Studies

- CMSS presents the Ross Ellis Memorial Lecture in Military and Strategic Studies. This annual lecture series honors Lt. Colonel Ross Ellis (1915-1983), Commander of the Calgary Highlanders. Dedicated to his leadership abilities and military spirit, the series brings a renowned specialist in military and strategic studies to speak to the University community and general public. The 2007 lecture will be held 12-14 June featuring the Honorable David Pratt. His lectures are themed "Is There a Grand Strategy to Canadian Foreign Policy?".

- Canadian Military Journalism Course

- A ten day scholarship program for journalism students, sponsored by the Canadian Defence & Foreign Affairs Institute, hosted by CMSS adjunct assistant professor and graduate, Dr. Bob Bergen (May 2007).

- Graduate Program

- Support for graduate students;
- Increase enrollment in on-campus MSS program;
- Establish a formal PhD program, offering competitive funding packages for

- recruitment;
 - Market and recruit students for the newly established MSS Co-op program.
- **Engagement of students and support of student activities**
 - Postdoctoral Fellowship Program: Host one post-doctoral fellowship, newly named the CMSS J.L. Granatstein Post-Doctoral Fellowship, worth a total of \$43,000;
 - Support for graduate students: travel and related support for thesis research and conference participation; research associate stipends;
 - Support undergraduate students
 - Provide support for the 10th Annual SMSS international conference (2008);
 - Ongoing support for SMSS activities.
- **Enhanced cooperation with other Institutes, on and off campus**
 - **Council for Canadian Security in the 21st Century** – The Council for Canadian Security in the 21st Century (CCS21) founded in 2001 is a broad-based national organization which encourages Canadians and their government to provide adequate numbers of well-equipped, well-trained Regular and Reserve military forces to protect Canada's interests. Key objectives include non-partisan participation in public debate about defence through preparation of reports and articles for circulation to government, media and the interested public.
 - **Royal Military College of Canada** - Educational opportunities and partnerships will be pursued in cooperation with RMC.
 - **Canadian Forces Leadership Institute** - Educational opportunities and partnerships will be pursued in cooperation with CFLI.
 - **Canadian Forces College** - Educational opportunities and partnerships will be pursued in cooperation with Canadian Forces College.
- **Outreach and Dissemination of SDF Program Output**
 - Media and advertising campaign to be enhanced; increase CMSS profile in the media;
 - Increase numbers of high quality graduate students;
 - Increase website presence;
 - Sustain cooperation with DND Public Affairs.
- **Visiting Scholars**
 - Host the J.L. Granatstein Post-doctoral fellow;
 - Invite professors from international and national universities to teach courses to MSS and PhD students:
 - CMSS will be hosting Dr. Michael Epkenhans of the Otto von Bismarck Foundation in Hamburg in September 2007 who will be teaching the block week course, *Sea Power*.
 - Dr. Shaul Shay will be at CMSS in the fall teaching a second block week course, *The State and Terrorism*. Dr. Shay is a lecturer at Bar Ilan University, senior research fellow of the International Policy Institute for Counter Terrorism (ICT) at the Interdisciplinary Center, Herzilya and heads the Department of Military History of the Israeli Defense Forces.

- **Conferences**

- The Centre for Military and Strategic Studies will host *Forced to Change: Education and Reform in the Canadian Forces 10 Years After*, 15-18 November 2007. This conference will examine the 10 years since the release of the 1997 Young Report, a report to the Prime Minister on the Leadership and Management of the Canadian Forces.
- *Arms and Politics in Latin America*, in association with the Latin American Research Centre, University of Calgary (Fall 2007).

Describe the relationship and work of research associates

Research associates are involved in teaching, research and possibly supervisory roles at CMSS. Each associate has, or is in the process of receiving, a Doctoral degree.

Describe any post-doctoral or post-masters accomplishments

Maureen Shields held the 2006/07 Post-Masters position at CMSS. While continuing to research the post 9/11 Canada-US defence relationship, Ms. Shields has also broadened her focus to Canada-US security. While homeland defence refers to the use of a state's armed forces to protect the country, homeland security refers to a nation's efforts to prevent attacks on the homeland. Cooperation among defence and security organizations, domestically as well as bi-laterally, is a significant challenge for both countries. She is considering some issues in Canada-US critical infrastructure protection as well as some trilateral (Canada/US/Mexico) security issues.

CMSS did not have any Post-doctoral positions this year.
